NO-MO (Non-Motorized) Trails

The US Army Corps of Engineers' staff and volunteers manages several miles of trails on the northeastern shore of Proctor Lake. These public trails are open to non-motorized recreation, such as horseback riding, offroad bicycling, hiking, and trail running. There are no potable water, bathroom, electrical, or trash disposal facilities along the trails or in the Day-Use areas, so prepare accordingly and pack all trash out. Exercise caution when recreating around horses. Users assume all risk for all recreation activities, and must comply with Title 36 regulations and all federal, state, and local laws. Camping is only allowed in designated facilities.

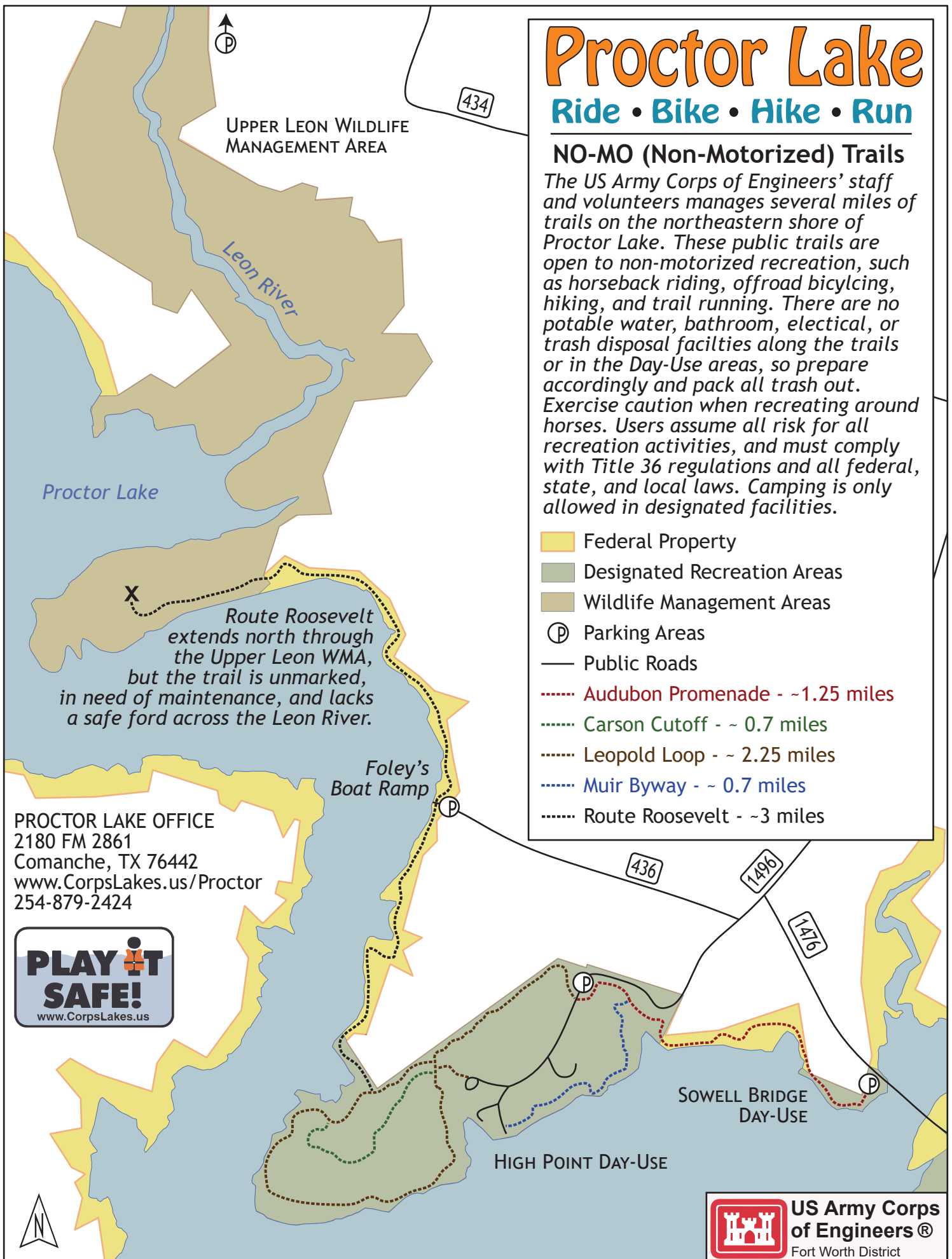
 Audubon Promenade - ~1.25 miles
